

Information in this booklet may change during the school year, and you will be notified.




Admission Criteria (Initial and Transfer from another school)

1. Children of compulsory school age who normally reside in the Parish of Drumgooland and in the historical catchment area. (The details of this are available from the school).
2. Children who have brothers/sisters (including half brothers, half sisters, step brothers, step sisters, foster brothers and/or foster sisters) currently enrolled in St Mary's Primary School.
3. Children of permanent employees of the school.
4. Children for whom St Mary's Primary School is the closest voluntary primary school to their home.
5. Children who live closest to St Mary's Primary School based on distance between the child's place of residence and the entrance gate of the school as measured in a straight line on an Ordnance Survey Map.
6. In the event of a tie for last place at criterion 5, pupils will be selected for admission on the basis of initial letter of surname (as entered on Birth Certificate) in order set out below:

Date of Admission

Children will be admitted to Y1 if their fourth birthday has fallen on or before 1st July 2017. Parents must bring their child's birth certificate and Baptismal certificate on the first day of admission.

Visiting the School

It is the aim of St. Mary's Primary School - Dechomet to involve parents in the education of their children, and to inform them as fully as possible about their children's progress.

Before Enrolment

- (a) We will contact you before your child is due to start and invite you to meet the teacher and see the classroom. As your child changes classes, we will make every effort for you to meet your child's new teacher before the change takes place.*

- (b) Entrants who have previously attended another school*
 - (1) An interview will be arranged with the Principal.*
 - (2) Parents will be welcome to view the school premises.*
 - (3) A meeting can be arranged with the prospective teacher/s of the child or children.*

After Enrolment

Once your child commences school there are many opportunities for staff and parents to meet. Some of these will be on a formal basis, and you will be notified in due course of the dates; i.e. Parent Interviews.




Parental Visits to the School

Parents play a vital role in the education of the child. We endeavour to ensure that parents feel welcome and that they are kept informed about all aspects of school life. Parents are very welcome to come to the school to discuss their children's progress, or if a problem arises. To avoid disruption of classroom work, the following procedure should be followed.

- (a) *Emergency* - Parents should contact the Principal, who will arrange a discussion with himself or the class teacher.
- (b) *Non-emergency* - Parents should contact either the School Secretary or Principal, who will arrange an interview with the class teacher at a mutually convenient time.

If parents visit the school, they **must** contact the Principal before going to the class teacher.

Phone calls are necessary, but during the school day a teacher's responsibility is with the children. Teachers may take brief and urgent phone calls, otherwise, it is more convenient to telephone after school hours (3.15 pm to 3.40 pm)



CURRICULUM


General Aims

It is the policy of the Board of Governors of St Mary's Primary School, Dechomet, to educate the children in the fullest possible sense, having regard for the spiritual, moral, cultural, intellectual and physical development of the pupils.

Therefore, it is important that we are sensitive to individual, class, school and locality needs, in planning a balanced and broadly based curriculum, where no subject area is neglected.

The curriculum will seek to prepare the pupils for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences of adult life. It will also be the aim of the school to maximise the potential of each pupil, to develop self-confidence and to promote a spirit of tolerance towards others.

A Catholic school should instil in its children an awareness of and a love of Catholic values. Therefore children should acquire a sound knowledge and understanding of their Catholic faith. Each child should develop self-respect and respect for others.



NORTHERN IRELAND CURRICULUM

All pupils will receive their full entitlement under the Northern Ireland Curriculum.

The Curriculum is divided up into the following areas of learning:

The Curriculum is delivered in three stages:

<i>Year 1, Year 2</i>	-	<i>Foundation Stage*</i>
<i>Year 3, Year 4</i>	-	<i>Key Stage One</i>
<i>Year 5, Year 6, Year 7</i>	-	<i>Key Stage Two</i>

** The Foundation Stage was introduced in September 2007 - Please find enclosed information leaflets providing extra information on the Revised Curriculum.*

Within these areas of learning are compulsory subjects for each of which there will be programmes of study which contain statements of attainment. In Year 4 and 7 children will have to be assessed, and the progress they have made will be reported to the parents.

St. Mary's Primary School - Dechomet has always encouraged pupils to develop their musical ability. The younger children work on pitch, rhythm and tone. As the children get older, they progress to tin whistle and learn to read musical notation. As well,

Education Authority tutors provide weekly lessons in stringed and brass instruments.

Parents will be informed of their child's progress by:

- a) An annual interview at which parents will be informed of the school's view of the child's progress, and also of any information given by the assessment procedures of the Northern Ireland Schools Examination and Assessment Council.*
- b) Parents will receive a written report on each pupil's progress.*

COMPLAINTS RE: THE CURRICULUM


In accordance with the school's policy of involving the parents in the education of their children in those cases where parents consider that the curriculum provision is not satisfactory, they are welcome to express their concerns. This should be done in accordance with the following procedure. In the vast majority of cases, the problems will be solved at Stages 1 or 2. In the cases of serious complaints, the concerns should be specifically detailed in writing and given to the principal to enable the matter to be examined, and a reply to be made.

HOLIDAY ARRANGEMENTS

The school will be closed for the months of July and August. Information about other holidays i.e. Christmas, Easter, Holy Days of Obligation and mid-term breaks will be sent to parents at the beginning of September.

In the event of an emergency closure, every attempt will be made to notify parents to enable them to make alternative arrangements.



ATTENDANCE

Regular attendance, punctuality and your continued interest are very important. Lateness and absences are recorded in class registers. Please telephone the school or send a note of explanation to the class teacher when this arises. It is distressing for a child to arrive late, work will have begun in class and the child will have missed the initial explanation. Dinners are booked, based on the children in attendance at registration, so a child who arrives late can cause disruption. Whilst it is unwise to send children to school when they are ill, it is important that they do not lose days unnecessarily as every day is important in a child's educational development. There will be no supervision of pupils before 8.50 am and after 3.25 pm. No responsibility for children will be accepted outside those times. Please refer to school website for Attendance Policy.



RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Our religious education programme based on the 'Grow in Love' series goes beyond the requirements of the core Religious Education syllabus agreed by the main Churches. It prepares each child for participation in the Liturgy and Sacraments of the Catholic Church. Religious Education is not confined to the timetable programme within the school, but pervades the whole life of our school.

CHILDREN HELPING CHILDREN

Each year we fundraise/collect for a specific charity. It is important that the children feel that they are helping other children who are less fortunate than themselves.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR CHILDREN WITH SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS

Whilst the staff seek always to meet the individual needs of every child, sometimes a child may experience difficulties which give teachers and parents cause for concern. The school will endeavour within its resources to meet these needs. After close consultation with parents, the Education Authority may be called upon to help and recommend strategies which may be used to overcome difficulties.



At pre school stage your GP should be contacted if you have any concerns re your child's language and communication development.

Early identification and intervention is always advisable.

Since it is our school's policy to do the best for each child, teachers will organise their classes in a variety of ways to cater for the individual needs of the children in their care

HOMWORK POLICY

Homework is regarded as an integral part of every pupil's learning. Parents are encouraged to be actively involved in their children's homework. Homework set by the school should be supervised by parents. Pupils must get used to the discipline of home study and accept it as an extension of their school work. We encourage our parents to contact their child's teacher if there are any difficulties regarding homework. It may also be necessary for the teacher to contact the child's parents about any problems arising. It is suggested that time spent on homework should be:

Year 1-3 30 minutes

Year 4-7 45-60 minutes

LOOKING AFTER BOOKS

The school cannot afford to buy new text books every year for each pupil. It is important that parents encourage their children to take care of their text books and exercise books. It would be appreciated if the books could be covered at home.



PASTORAL CARE

All staff in the school have as one of their responsibilities the day to day care of all children in the school. Each child is treated as an individual and the interests of each child are foremost in the minds of those who are working in school. If you have any worries or concerns about your child in school or at home please speak to the class teacher or principal. It is important that your child is happy and confident in school and that can be achieved if parents and teachers work together.

Mr Doyle is the designated teacher in charge of the schools Pastoral Care Policies. All statutory requirements regarding Pastoral Care and Child Protection are outlined in these policies and are fully implemented in this school. Mrs Margaret McEvoy is the designated teacher and Mrs Fiona O'Callaghan the deputy designated teacher for Child Protection. All staff including ancillary staff follow these procedures closely.

When a child is sick or injured the school will endeavour to contact the parent. If this is not possible the child will be brought to hospital.

*Parents should leave an **Emergency Contact Number** with the Principal.*

SCHOOL DISCIPLINE

We have very few rules. Those that we have are to enable a large community to work together safely. Some rules are based on our expectations of any individual, others are based on respect and care for others.

We encourage children to work and play together, accept responsibility for their own actions, and show concern for themselves as well as caring for others. Parents and pupils must accept the values of the school and the classroom. Good behaviour

is that conduct which assists the school to fulfil its function, namely the full development of the potential of all its pupils.

The school has produced a separate policy on positive behaviour, and this is available on request to all actual or prospective parents. It can also be viewed on our school website.

Pupils are not allowed mobile phones in the school.

EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

St Mary's Primary School considers the extra curricular activities it offers add a very valuable dimension to the education of the children. These activities may include outdoor pursuits, hill walking, swimming, Cycling Proficiency, football, netball, hurling/camogie, tag rugby, tin whistle, crafts (e.g. woodwork). Introduction to the Irish Language and drama (school plays).

School Trips

There is usually an annual school trip and occasionally a Christmas trip to a pantomime. We also try to arrange as many educational trips as possible to compliment 'World Around Us' topics. Teachers will inform parents of:

- 1. Destination*
- 2. Time of departure*
- 3. Time of return*
- 4. Place(s) to collect children*
- 5. What children must bring with them*



Each teacher must have a list of names, addresses, and telephone numbers of the children in their care.

Visits by Outside Agencies

Regularly, we request additional personnel to visit our school to enhance the curriculum such as nurses, musicians, health and safety officers, story tellers to mention but a few. Such visitors enrich the curriculum.

After Schools Clubs

We run a variety of 'After Schools' Clubs'. These include a daily Foundation Club for our Reception to Year 3 children which runs from 2.00pm to 3.10pm each day throughout the school year. There is a small charge for this club.

All pupils can avail of irish dancing, a variety of sports and film clubs, as they become available during the school year.



Annual Inter Schools Sports Day

The Annual Inter Schools Sports Day takes place in the third term. This involves pupils from Dromara Primary School, St Michael's Primary School Finniss and ourselves joining together to have a 'Fun Sports Day'. Parents are more than welcome to attend.

HELPING CHILDREN TO LOOK AFTER THEIR OWN COATS AND SHOES

Our Cloakroom

At the beginning of the school year each child is allocated a numbered coat hook. It helps the child to have a special numbered hook on which to keep his/her own personal possessions.

Name tags should be attached to all articles of clothing.

SCHOOL MEALS

If the children wish to have school dinners parents are requested to send in the dinner money on Monday mornings or to pay for the meals on a daily basis. Free school meal forms are available from the Principal. Any money not used due to absence is credited to the following week. All children are supervised in the dining hall while having their dinner, and they are encouraged to eat the meals available.

Children who bring their own lunch to school will be able to eat this in their classroom. These children will also be supervised while eating their lunch. It is much more practical for young children if their refreshments are in plastic containers rather than in glass bottles. School lunches must not be put in school bags.



School Milk

There will be a carton of milk available for each child at break-time. If parents would like their children to have milk please inform their class teacher. Milk must be paid for on a termly or half termly basis (parents will be notified by letter of the amount) and the total amount must be sent into school at the beginning of each term. Milk money can only be refunded if a child is absent

for more than four days, but the Principal must be informed immediately if you wish to cancel your child's milk.

Charging & Remissions Policy

Education in St Mary's Primary School Dechomet is provided free of charge for all lessons and activities connected with the child's entitlement under the Education Reform Order. A Parents' Support Group in the school has helped 'funding' in the past but it is stressed that no child will be disadvantaged in any way, if parents choose not to make a contribution.

The school may take part in 'optional extras' which are not connected with the school's formal curriculum, such as visits to a museum. Charges will be made for these, but it is again stressed that failure to participate in these will not affect a child's performance at school.


